If you need a place to live immediately, contact or show up at a youth, young adult, or family **EMERGENCY SHELTER** or **DROP-IN CENTER** (see left column). If you need a place to live, but do not have a job or income, or are transitioning out of foster care of juvenile justice system, apply for as many **TRANSITIONAL** housing programs (see center column) as possible. If you already live in transitional housing, are looking for a permanent place to live, and/ or are unemployed or low-income, then apply for **SUPPORTIVE OR AFFORDABLE PERMANENT**

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SUPPORTIVE PERMANENT HOUSING:

ELLIS STREET APARTMENTS (LARKIN STREET YOUTH SERVICES):

Free permanent supportive housing for homeless 18-24 years old. There is case-management on site and educational opportunities, employment training, medical care, HIV services, and recreation off-site. PHONE: (415) 673-0911 x 216.

COMMUNITY HOUSING PARTNERSHIP:

Permanent housing for formerly homeless people with on-site support services, job training, leader-ship development and employment opportunities. Residents include formerly homeless singles and families in the Tenderloin or Treasure Island. Call the intake coordinator to learn more about cost and eligibility: Applications for housing can be filled out and submitted online. Waitlist can be years. For intake, contact the CHP Intake Coordinator. PHONE: (415) 241-0310.

SHELTER PLUS CARE:

Subsidized rental units for individuals living on streets or shelter in San Francisco who suffer from substance abuse, serious mental health issue, symptomatic HIV/AIDS. Shelter Plus Care requires photo ID, Social Security Card, and verification of homelessness to enroll. Waiting list is currently closed, however, opens periodically. PHONE: (415) 557-6449.

DIRECT ACCESS to HOUSING:

DAH is a supportive permanent housing program for single adults who are formerly homeless or atrisk of homelessness in San Francisco. To be eligible, you must have a yearly income of \$22,600 or below and willing to pay a portion of your monthly income--usually 50%--through a third party payer. You must be referred to DAH by a social worker, case manager, or counselor. To apply, have your case manager or social worker call DAH. *As of 1/2013, new referrels to DAH have been suspended, but may open periodically. PHONE: (415) 544-2772.

AFFORDABLE PERMANENT HOUSING:

BELOW MARKET RATE (BMR) RENTAL UNITS:

To find a BMI unit, check the regularly updated listing overseen by the San Francisco's Mayor's Office of Housing (MOH): http://sf-moh.org/index.aspx?page=152. To apply, you'll need to complete a BMR application (see here) and attach your most recent paystubs, bank/asset statements and tax forms. You must apply for each new development as it comes up. For most units, there is no a waiting list. Please contact the rental manager for each new unit for basic information on the units and for an application. NON-PROFIT AFFORDABLE and LOW-INCOME RENTAL UNITS:

To find an affordable housing unit in a non-profit housing development in San Francisco, you must contact the nonprofit agencies that manage them directly. Check the regularly updated listing of openings here: http://sf-moh.org/index.aspx?page=153. If you have a larger question or concern,

SECTION 8 HOUSING:

Section 8 is designed to increase affordable housing opportunities for low-income populations. Section 8 housing facilities are managed by the San Francisco Housing

Authority. It is easier to obtain Section 8 housing outside of San Francisco and Alameda Counties in the Bay Area. Section 8 Housing in San Francisco is currently completely occupied. There will not be an opportunity to apply for Section 8 housing in San Francisco for the next 5-10 years. When space on the waiting list becomes available, posters will be posted.
